Lariba is attending a business school in Northern Ghana, Tamale. She chose to attend school in Tamale because the school has lower tuition and fees that she can afford. Her parents are divorce. Currently, Lariba lives with another woman in Ashanti Region of Ghana, Kumasi where she works as a house maid. During holidays and vacations, Lariba travels 235 miles / 378 km from Tamale to Kumasi to work to earn money for her education. Lariba is determined to continue her education to become an accountant but her dream may not be possible without financial support. Without an education, Lariba will have few choices. She may end up working for little pay in bad conditions such as selling things on the street (Kayaayoo Girl) which is dangerous because she could get raped or may engage in early marriage, and unwanted pregnancy. Without an education, she won't have a chance to improve her life and the lives of others in her community.

C. Training



By providing "micro" loans, business training and other financial services to poor men and women who start their own businesses, Sabu Help assist people work their way up the economic ladder, with dignity and pride.

Why We Do What We Do

Sabu Help believes that the world poor can build better lives for themselves if only given the chance. The poor don't lack ability, they lack opportunities. A lifetime of struggling for food and shelter fosters the kind of single-minded drive that it takes to start and build a small business for livelihood. Rather than being victims, the world's poor are the key to their own emergence from poverty. Sabu Help's goal is to provide that missing opportunity, education and resources so that the poor may learn to help themselves to find better ways to produce food, earn an income, and raise healthy families. By giving them opportunities, they can begin to build their own better futures.

We believe that by helping poor families to increase their income will have an immediate and lasting impact on the quality of life -- the ability to afford food, shelter, education, and healthcare. We hope our overall program will:

As their business income increases, the business will be able to expand, and the effect will spread beyond the family into the local community through employment and contributions to the community development and local economy growth.

Understating the importance and the impact of Microenterprise

Microcredit is the extension of very small loans (microloans), without collateral, to struggling entrepreneurs. Due to its success, microcredit has gained much credibility in the mainstream finance industry. Microfinance is a tool for struggling entrepreneurs in the

developing world. With capital at affordable market interest rates, entrepreneurs can expand their businesses and generate steady incomes. With business loans, Sabu Help' clients gain the ability to work their way out of poverty for the first time in their lives. As they increase their incomes, clients are able to adequately feed their children, buy school uniforms, books, and pay tuition for better schools. Many clients eventually hire family members and friends in their growing businesses, providing income to additional families.

Microloans enable poor entrepreneurs (our clients) to:

- Start a business or expand existing ones
- Purchase seeds, livestock, tools and raw materials for production
- Increase productivity
- Build a better life
- Gain self sufficiency
- Satisfy local market demand
- Meet human basic need (water, food, shelter)

- Many Sabu Helps' clients start with small business loans of \$115
- Since loans are repaid with interest, donations create an everlasting impact
- Sabu Help serves the rural communities where we expect 100 percent of client's repayment every loan.




\$100 loan put Ajua to work



Nelson has passed all his classes and wishes to continue his education to become a teacher or police officer. After graduation from High School, he was unable to continue his education because of financial limitations. Nelson stayed home and supported his mom to assist his younger sister Leona to attend Secondary School. Nelson currently has been offered an admission into Police Training College. Without a financial support, Nelson will have few choices. He may not be able to attend college end up staying home and have no means to earn income to support himself and his family. He may be recruitment into rebels group or related illegal groups. Without an education, he won't have a chance to improve his life, support his sisters and others in her community.




